1. Operation of the Fund

ING DIRECT Superannuation Fund (the 'Fund') was established by a Trust Deed dated 13 June 2012 as a public offer complying superannuation fund. The Fund accepts contributions from a range of contributors. The Fund is domiciled in Australia and the address of the Fund's registered office is Suite 710 / Level 7, 530 Little Collins Street Melbourne, VIC 3001.

The Fund is a defined contribution fund (whereby contributions of the employers and the employees are made in accordance with the terms of the Trust Deed). The members' accounts are credited or debited each year with contributions and their proportionate share of the net investment income, expenses and income tax expense of the Fund.

The trustee of the Fund is The Trust Company (Superannuation) Limited (the 'Trustee') and it is the holder of a public offer class Registrable Superannuation Entity License (licence no. L0000635). In accordance with amendments to the Superannuation Industry (Supervision) Act 1993 the Fund was registered with the Australian Prudential Regulation Authority on 6 July 2012 (registration no. R107471).

ING DIRECT, a division of ING Bank (Australia) Limited AFSL 229823, is the Promoter of the Fund (the 'Promoter'). The Administrator of the Fund is Financial Synergy Pty Ltd (the 'Administrator').

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements are a general purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standard AAS 25 'Financial Reporting by Superannuation Plans', other accounting standards to the extent applicable, the provisions of the Trust Deed and the Superannuation Industry (Supervision) Act 1993 and Regulations.

The financial statements are presented in Australian Dollars and all values are rounded to the nearest \$'000 except where otherwise indicated. Both the functional and presentation currency of the fund is Australian Dollars.

(b) Statement of compliance

The financial statements comply with AAS 25. Since AAS 25 is the principal standard that applies to the financial statements, other standards, including Australian Accounting Standards issued by the AASB are also applied where necessary except to the extent that they differ from AAS 25.

International Financial Reporting Standards ('IFRS') form the basis of Australian Accounting Standards adopted by the AASB. The financial statements of the Fund do not comply with IFRS.

The financial statements were approved by the board of directors of the Trustee, on the date of the Trustee Statement in this financial report.

(c) New accounting standards and interpretations

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that became effective for the first time for the Fund for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2014 are outlined below.

(d) Investments

Investments of the Fund are initially recognised at fair value plus transaction costs.

After initial recognition, investments are measured at net market value. The change in the net market value of investments is recognised in the Operating Statement.

Net market value of investments have been determined as follows:

- Shares in listed entities, fisted unit trusts, government and other fixed interest securities:
 These are valued at last quoted price by an exchange at close of business on the balance date;
- Shares in unlisted entitles and unit trusts:
 Unlisted unit trusts are valued at fair value through the profit and loss. Fair value is deemed to be exit price determined by the managers of the trusts at balance date.
- . Term deposits

Term deposits are readily convertible to cash and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

Estimated costs of disposal have been deducted in determining net market value. As disposal costs are generally immaterial, unless otherwise stated net market value is considered a reasonable approximation of fair value.

Purchases and sale of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame generally establised by regulation or convention in the market place are recognised on the trade date i.e. the date that the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset.

The Fund owns 100% of the issued units in the unlisted unit trusts in which the Fund invests.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(e) Principles of consolidation

The Fund holds 100% of the unlisted unit trusts as detailed in Note 6 to the financial statements. The Fund has determined that it is an investment entity as defined by AASB 10/AASB 2013-5. As a superannuation fund its main objectives are to provide a pool of members with an investment return and investment management services, to invest members' funds solely for returns from capital appreciation, investment income, or both and the performance of substantially all of its investments is measured and evaluated on a fair value basis.

As a result of adopting AASB 10/AASB 2013-5, the Fund does not consolidate these unit trusts and the Fund records the investments in the unlisted unit trusts at fair value through the Operating Statement. Fair value is deemed to be the redemption price determined for each unlisted unit trust, which equates to its net market value.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and short-term deposits in the statement of financial position comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less that are readily convertible to cash, and subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents consists of cash and cash equivalents as defined above.

(g) Receivables and other payables

Receivables are carried at nominal amounts due which approximate net market value. Receivables are normally settled within 30 days. An allowance for uncollectible amounts is only made where there is objective evidence that the debt will not be collected.

Other payables are carried at nominal amounts which approximate net market value. They represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Fund prior to the end of the financial year that are unpaid when the Fund becomes obliged to make future payments in respect of the purchase of these goods or services. Payables are normally settled on 30 day terms.

(h) Benefits payable

Benefits payable are valued at net market value which comprises the entitlements of members who ceased employment prior to the yearend but had not been paid at that time. Benefits payable are settled within 30 days.

(i) Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised and measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Fund and the revenue can be reliably measured. The following specific recognition criteria must also be met before revenue is recognised:

Changes in net market value

Changes in the net market value of investments are calculated as the difference between the net market value at sale, or at balance date, and the net market value at the previous valuation point. All changes are recognised in the Operating Statement.

Contributions revenue and transfers in

Contributions revenue and transfers in are recognised when control of the asset has been attained and are recorded, gross of any tax, in the period to which they relate.

Interest

Interest revenue on cash and other financial assets carried at net market value is recorded according to the terms of the contract and when the Fund's right to receive the interest is established.

Dividends and Distributions

Revenue is recognised when the right to receive payment is established.

Group Life insurance proceeds

Insurance claim amounts are recognised where the insurer has agreed to pay the claim lodged and transferred the claim amount to the Fund.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(j) Income Tax

The Fund is a complying superannuation fund for the purposes of the provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act. Accordingly, the concessional tax rate of 15% has been applied to the Fund's taxable income.

Income tax in the Operating Statement for the year comprises current and deferred tax.

Current tax expense is the expected tax payable on the taxable income for the year using the concessional tax rate of 15% for Fund income and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years. Assessable income referable to pension liabilities may be exempt from tax.

Current tax assets and liabilities for the current and prior periods are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities based on the current period's taxable income. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted by the balance date.

Deferred income tax is provided on all temporary differences at the balance date between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes.

Deferred income tax liabilities are recognised for all taxable temporary differences except where the deferred income tax liability arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

Deferred income tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, carry-forward of unused tax assets and unused tax losses, to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry-forward of unused tax assets and unused tax losses can be utilised, except where the deferred income tax asset relating to the deductible temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor the taxable profit or loss.

The carrying amount of deferred income tax assets is reviewed at each balance date and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow for all or part of deferred income tax to be utilised.

Unrecognised deferred income tax assets are reassessed at each balance date and are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the balance date.

Deferred tax assets and deferred tax liabilities are offset only if a legally enforceable right exists to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and the deferred tax assets and liabilities relate to the same taxable entity and the same taxation authority.

(k) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues are recognised net of the amount of GST where applicable. Expenses and assets are also recognised net of the amount of GST where applicable to the extent that the GST is recoverable from the taxation authority. Where GST is not recoverable, it is recognised as part of the cost of aquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item as applicable.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from taxation authority is included as part of receivables in the Statement of Financial Position.

Cash flows are included in the Statement of Cash Flows on a gross basis. The GST component of cash flows arising from investing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to the taxation authority are classified as operating cash flows.

(I) Accrued Benefits

The liability for accrued benefits is the Fund's present obligation to pay benefits to members and beneficiaries. This has been calculated as the difference between the carrying amounts of the assets and the carrying amounts of the sundry liabilities and income tax liabilities as at balance date.

(m) Significant accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the Fund's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amount recognised in the financial statements. However uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in the future. In the current year there have been no significant adjustments made.

3. Liability for Accrued Benefits

The liability for accrued benefits is the Fund's present obligation to pay benefits to members and beneficiaries and has been calculated as the difference between the carrying amounts of the assets and the carrying amounts of the sundry liabilities and income tax liabilities as at reporting date.

The investments of the Fund are managed on behalf of the Trustee by selected managers. The custodian of the Fund, State Street Australia Limited, holds the unlisted unit trusts.

The trustee of the Unlisted Unit Trusts is The Trust Company (Australia) Limited, and the principal place of business of the trusts is Level 15, 20 Bond Street Sydney NSW 2000. The Fund holds 100% of the units in the Unlisted Unit Trusts as an investment entity. The Unlisted Unit Trusts invest solely into cash at bank and State Street Global Advisors registered managed funds.

Refer to Note 2(d) for the methods adopted in determining the net market values of investments.

(a) Classification of Financial Instruments under the Fair Value Hierarchy

AAS 25 requires investments to be measured using net market value. The following table shows financial instruments recorded at net market value, analysed between those whose net market value is based on quoted market prices, those involving valuation techniques where all the model inputs are observable in the market and those where the valuation technique involves the use of non-market observable inputs that are significant to the determination of net market value. Net market value is considered a reasonable approximation of fair value. Listed Australian equities have been disclosed within Level 1 in the fair value hierarchy and term deposits and unlisted unit trusts have been disclosed within level 2, as the Trustee considers this is the most appropriate treatment.

15. Segment Information

The Fund operates in one reportable business segment, being the provision of benefits to members. The Fund also operates from one reportable geographic segment, being Australia, from where its activities are managed. While the Fund operates from Australia only, the Fund has investment exposures in different countries and across different industries, through its investment in the unitised unit trusts. Revenue is derived from interest, dividends, distributions, gains on sale of investments, unrealised changes in values of investments, and contributions revenue.

16. Related Party Disclosures

(a) Trustee and Key Management Personnel

The Trustee of the Fund is The Trust Company (Superannuation) Limited and is the holder of a Registrable Superannuation Entity Licence (licence no. L0000635).

The Directors of the Trustee company did not receive and are not due to receive any remuneration from the Fund in connection with the management of the Fund. Any director fees are paid to the Directors by the Trustee directly. During the year the Fund did not pay any trustee fees to the Trustee. As disclosed in Note 12 to the financial statements, the Promoter paid \$124,645 (2013:\$58,843) as trustee fees to the Trustee.

(b) Other Related Party Transactions

The Trust Company (Australia) Limited, a company related to the Trustee of the Fund, is the trustee of the Unlisted Unit Trusts into which the Fund invests. Details of these investments are disclosed in Note 6 to the financial statements.

ING Bank N.V. (Sydney Branch), a company related to the Promoter, acts as investment manager for the Cash Option, Term Deposits and the Cash Hub of the Fund. The investment in the Term Deposits and Cash Hub are disclosed in Note 6.

The promoter of the Fund, ING Direct, a division of ING Bank (Australia) Limited is paid a promoter fee as disclosed in Note 12.

There were no other related party transactions that require disclosure as at 30 June 2014.

17. Financial Risk Management Objectives and Policies

Introduction

The Fund's principal financial instruments comprise units in unlisted unit trusts, equity securities and term deposits. The main purpose of these financial instruments is to generate a return on investment. The Trustee does not intend to directly invest in futures, options or derivatives instruments however derivatives may be used for hedging and cash flow management as required.

The Fund also has various other financial instruments such as sundry receivables and payables, which arise directly from its operations, these are mainly current in nature.

Risk is inherent in the Fund's activities but it is managed through a process of ongoing identification, measurement, monitoring, subject to risk limits and other controls. The Fund is exposed to market risk (which includes currency risk, interest rate risk and price risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

17. Financial Risk Management Objectives and Policies (continued)

(a) Risk Management Structure

The Trustee is responsible for identifying and controlling the risks that arise from these financial instruments. The Trustee reviews and agrees policies for managing each of these risks as summarised below. The Fund also monitors the market price risk arising from all financial instruments. The risk framework is reviewed regularly by management and the board of directors.

Information about the total fair value of financial instruments exposed to risk, as well as compliance with established investment mandate limits, is monitored by the Trustee. These mandate limits reflect the investment strategy and market environment of the Fund, as well as the level of risk that the Fund is willing to accept.

This information is prepared and reported to the Trustee on a regular basis.

Concentrations of risk arise when a number of financial instruments or contracts are entered into with the same counterparty, or when a number of counterparties are engaged in similar business activities, have activities in the same geographic region, or have similar economic features that would cause their ability to meet contractual obligational to be similarly affected by changes in economic, political or other conditions.

In order to avoid excessive concentrations of risk, the Fund monitors its exposure to ensure concentrations of risk remain within acceptable levels in accordance with the Fund mandate and either reduces exposure or uses derivative instruments to manage the excessive risk concentrations when they arise.

(b) Credit Risk

Credit risk represents the risk that the counterparty to the financial instrument will fail to discharge an obligation and cause the Fund to incur a financial loss,

The Fund is exposed to the risk of credit related losses that can occur as a result of a counterparty or issuer being unable or unwilling to honour its contractual obligations.

There are no significant assets that are past due or impaired. Credit risk is not considered to be significant to the Fund as the Fund did not hold any investments in debt instruments at the reporting date.

Information about the total fair value of financial instruments exposed to risk, as well as compliance with established investment mandate limits, is monitored by the Trustee. These mandate limits reflect the investment strategy and market environment of the Fund, as well as the level of risk that the Fund is willing to accept.

17. Financial Risk Management Objectives and Policies (continued)

(c) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. This risk is controlled through the Fund's investment in financial instruments, which under normal market conditions are readily convertible to cash. In addition, the Fund maintains sufficient cash and cash equivalents to meet normal operating requirements.

The Fund's significant financial liabilities are benefits payable to members, current tax liabilities and vested benefits.

Other financial liabilities of the Fund comprise trade and other payables which are contractually due within 30 days.

The Fund's financial instruments include unlisted investments that are not traded in organised public markets and may be illiquid. As a result the Fund may not be able to liquidate some of its investments at an amount close to fair value in order to meet its liquidity requirements. The value of these investments is monitored to comply with the asset allocation stipulated by the Fund's investment strategy and commitment cash flow projections are analysed as part of the monthly rebalancing review of the Fund's investments. The risk in relation to illiquid investments is therefore considered minimal.

(d) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of financial instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market variables such as interest rates and equity prices. Market risk is minimised through ensuring that all investment activities are undertaken in accordance with established mandate limits and investment strategies.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk arises from the possibility that changes in interest rates will affect future cash flows or the fair values of financial instruments. The Fund has set investment allocation ranges to meet its objectives of holding a balanced portfolio, including limits on investments in interest bearing assets, which are monitored regularly. The Fund may use derivatives to hedge against unexpected increases in interest rates.

Other price risk

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting all similar financial instruments in the market. Investments in the Fund that are exposed to other price risk include Australian equities and unlisted unit trusts.

As the unlisted units trusts invests in a diversified underlying portfolio, the other price risk of the Fund is limited. Also the Australian equity investments are of a high quality and are publicly traded on the Australian Stock Exchange. The Trustee monitors the Fund's exposure to various indices on an ongoing basis throughout the year ensuring the mandate is not breached.

20. Operational Risk Financial Requirement (ORFR)

To meet the Fund's ORFR requirement the Trustee has established an Operational Risk Trustee Capital (ORTC) Reserve. The ORTC Reserve is designed to provide access to funds to address any losses arising from Fund risks in a timely manner. The ORTC Approved Investment will be invested such that it maintains a status equivalent to Common Equity Tier 1 Capital.
